


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MAP 3



POINTS OF INTEREST

1 Goatfell

Goatfell - 874m (Corbett)

The Arran skyline is dominated by the jagged summits and ridges of Goatfell and the surrounding hills, providing a dramatic backdrop to Brodick Castle. It is a spectacular example of an open, rugged, upland landscape formed during the last Ice Age. The walk up Goatfell is a popular high level walk enjoyed by thousands each year. On a clear day you may see as far as Ben Lomond to the north and the coast of Ireland to the south-west. However, mountains must be treated with respect and dramatic changes in the weather conditions can occur throughout the year. The summit can be cold, wet and windy, even in summer, and visibility can be quickly reduced to a few metres. Be prepared by carrying a map, compass, torch, food and drink, and waterproof and warm clothing.

The National Trust for Scotland have been caring for the Goatfell property for over 50 years. Their work includes repairing and maintaining the fragile mountain footpaths, restoration of upland bog habitats, and enabling the regeneration of native woodlands on the lower slopes of the hill. You can become involved in these projects, or can accompany the Rangers on a mountain walk to gain first hand experience of Arran's magnificent landscapes and wildlife.
