


Forestry Commission Scotland

The Forestry Commission first came to Arran in 1950 and on behalf of the people of Scotland, own and manage about a quarter of the Island, 11,000 hectares. Much of the land was planted with Sitka Spruce, a fast growing tree suited to the wet mild climate providing a useful timber. The forests are now reaching maturity and harvesting is well underway.


Arran's forests have so much to offer for outdoor recreation. If you want to explore, there are more than a dozen trails of all lengths and abilities from 30-minute strolls to half-day moorland routes. There are lochs and waterfalls to discover, especially Glenashdale with its spectacular viewpoint over the falls. Cairns and stone circles built by previous peoples are left for us to puzzle over and marvel at. Red squirrels and hen harrier are a common sight from the forest trails and roads.

There is an informative leaflet available about the different places to visit in the forest and ranger-led walks during the Wildlife and Outdoor Festivals and with other island organisations.


