This proposal relates to the removal of a further Grade 12 post and the matching of a staff member into a vacant post at the same level.

The proposal, linked to the reduction in staff from the already approved Voluntary Early Retirement process, means that there will be a reduction of capacity within the Community Learning and Development team. The priorities of Community Learning and Development include supporting equalities within our communities and as a result there is likely to be an impact on the level of service which is available to less advantaged communities across North Ayrshire. While redesign plans will seek to mitigate this and to ensure that the focus of the service remains in those most needing additional support to access opportunities, the service will be less responsive and reactionary than it is able to be at present with a larger cohort of staff.

We will continue to work closely with our partners to maximise the use of the resources we collectively have. We will ensure that our focus is on priorities including equalities and support for those who are most vulnerable within our communities.

9. Has there been any consultation on the (budget) proposal with any protected characteristic groups or other services or partner organisations?

It has not been possible to engage and consult on the proposal with partner organisations at this point as the staffing consultation is currently ongoing. When moving to a full ECRIA following the conclusion of this stage, there will be dialogue with our partners in the community and third sector to better understand how we can focus our resources to support them, and to ensure there is clarity of understanding as to the support which the service will provide to each of them. This will also help to identify any potential gaps in support which we may not currently be aware of.

10. What are the monitoring and review arrangements?

Monitoring and review arrangements in full will be designed following the completion of the full assessment, however these will include using existing trend data and ongoing evaluative work to understand any impact on the protected characteristic groups. This evaluative work includes the learner voice work with young people, adult learners, older people and community groups which provides robust information as to needs.
