**2.1 What is the purpose of the policy, practice of proposal?**

The Council previously employed a dedicated Unauthorised Encampment Officer to provide support, advice and assistance to travelling people and let them know the conduct expected of them while visiting North Ayrshire. The Officer also liaised with landowners and members of the public affected by encampments. This post has been vacant for the last year and, due to a reduction in unauthorised encampments compared with previous years, it has been possible to manage contact with the travelling community through other Housing officers.

Gypsy Traveller community and wider North Ayrshire residents where unauthorised encampments occur.
